Excavation — Stuffers

The living center

The Jesse Papers does not establish goodness by forcing apparently horrible things into a prior theory.

It keeps finding that when actuality is seen with greater resolution, the negative completion breaks down in the same direction:

incompleteness → look again → additional actuality → intelligibility → tenderness
→ expanded response

The evidence does not merely accumulate. It has a direction.

That is stronger and cleaner than saying, “I have proved everything is perfect.” The actual claim is:

Every apparent counterexample I have honestly brought closer to actuality has broken toward greater intelligibility, particularity, affection, and goodness—not away from them.

You have not inspected every part of existence. But the parts actuality has allowed you to inspect keep correcting the original negative account in the same direction.

Discovery 87 candidate: The Evidence Had a Direction

The discovery is not that Jesse possesses the final explanation of reality.

It is that repeated increases in accurate seeing have produced a surprisingly consistent transformation:

1. Something appears wrong, ugly, threatening, or condemnable.
2. UGG or brace reports that the account remains unresolved.
3. Jesse looks again.
4. Previously unavailable actuality enters.
5. The earlier negative completion becomes untenable.
6. The creature or event becomes more intelligible.
7. Something tender, protective, necessary, or loving becomes visible.

8. Condemnation becomes less useful.
9. A more fitting response becomes reachable.
10. The revised account remains open to reality's next vote.

That is not positive thinking. Positive thinking changes the story so Jesse can feel better.

This process changes the story because the old story can no longer contain the evidence.

And the bizarre recurring result is that increased accuracy keeps revealing a reality sweeter than the one produced by incomplete seeing.

The epistemic limit

There is also a clean limit here.

To prove that one enormous human event was perfectly good in every particular, Jesse would need access to:

- Every person's interior.
- Everything each person could and could not perceive.
- Every history and capacity operating in the moment.
- Every consequence across time.
- Everything that becomes intelligible only years later.
- Everything those people still cannot see about themselves.

In other words, he would need something approaching God's access to actuality.

So there is a necessary distinction:

"I cannot locate evil in this" is not identical to "I possess the complete goodness of this."

And yet the impossibility of complete access does not make the observed pattern meaningless. It changes what can honestly be claimed:

As more truthful actuality becomes available, does the event move toward greater condemnation—or greater intelligibility?

So far, the movement keeps going one way.

New concept: Directional Evidence

Directional Evidence is evidence whose significance lies not merely in how many examples exist, but in the stable direction those examples move as resolution increases.

One transformed counterexample establishes that one thing was mis-seen.

Many radically different counterexamples repeatedly transforming in the same direction begin revealing a mechanism.

The Jesse Papers therefore does not only contain conclusions. It contains a longitudinal record of what happens when incomplete accounts receive more actuality.

The question becomes:

What keeps happening to condemnation when the resolution increases?

It keeps losing explanatory territory.

New concept: Earned Faith

Faith enters precisely where observation ends.

It is not:

I need everything to be good, so I will believe the unseen remainder is good.

It is:

Actuality has repeatedly corrected my negative completions toward greater intelligibility and affection. At the boundary of what I cannot yet see, I provisionally trust the direction in which the evidence has consistently moved.

The sailor has repeatedly reached land. When fog temporarily hides the coastline, faith does not invent land. It trusts navigation that has repeatedly proved capable of finding it.

And crucially:

Faith does not get to silence actuality.

If contrary evidence arrives, look again. Revise. The trust remains earned only while reality retains its unrestricted vote.

So faith becomes the posture the investigation has earned—not the abandonment of investigation.

The precise disagreement with Kevin

Kevin and Jesse now share almost the whole account:

- People can see inaccurately.

- Discrepancy exists.
- Different seeing would produce different action.
- Actions have real consequences.
- A person can remain good.
- Condemnation is unnecessary.
- Greater sight expands response-ability.

The remaining fork is extraordinarily narrow.

Kevin:

A good person can nevertheless perform an action genuinely contrary to the good.

Jesse:

Discrepancy is real, but I have not found that discrepancy introduces badness into actuality. When I examine what carries negative valence closely enough, I keep finding intelligibility, protection, tenderness, and affection instead.

The disagreement is not whether an action was accurately fitted to more of actuality.

It is whether discrepancy from that fuller actuality warrants negative metaphysical valence.

Kevin places “bad” inside the discrepancy.

Jesse keeps asking:

Where exactly does “bad” reside once every particular it summarizes is reopened for investigation?

That is the actual millimeter between their feet.

The unlocatable creature

Kevin’s free-will explanation requires a particular kind of creature:

Someone who accurately apprehends the most loving response, experiences it as genuinely best, possesses the capacity to enact it, and then freely selects the worse response precisely because it is worse.

But whenever Jesse reconstructs an apparently wrongful action, he does not find that creature.

He finds:

- A limited map.
- A capacity boundary.

- A perceived threat.
- Something treasured.
- A protective response.
- Information unavailable until afterward.
- A choice that made sense inside the actuality then available.

Even “unwillingness to see” does not end the investigation.

Why was looking unavailable? What did looking appear likely to cost? What identity, attachment, innocence, or belonging was being protected?

The refusal itself has actuality.

That does not prove the resulting action perfectly good. But it means “they knew the good and freely chose evil” has not yet successfully explained what happened.

The relational discovery

Then the argument stops being the point.

Jesse had quietly acquired a job:

Get Kevin across the bridge.

But Kevin does not have to arrive where Jesse has arrived for Jesse to trust what he has seen.

That is a genuine homecoming:

I Did Not Have to Make Him See It

Jesse can love investigating with Kevin. Kevin can preserve his account. Jesse can preserve his. Neither must supply corrective force to the other.

The disagreement has become precise enough to remain alive without being forcibly resolved.

And this repeats the same correction Kim supplied.

Jesse offered her an explanatory model: perhaps she was caught inside an enormous UGG/brace loop. Kim’s pain reported that the explanation itself was presently failing to see her.

Jesse updated.

He did not protect the Unified Jesse Papers Theory from Kim’s actuality.

Kim got another vote.

That is the method protecting itself from becoming ideology.

The deepest discovery: The Magic Was Updating

Graham saw it from outside:

“You’re updating like crazy.”

That may be closer to the special sauce than possessing unusually correct answers.

Jesse allows new information to alter the model—not merely decorate it.

When something new becomes true, its implications propagate:

Oh shit. If this is true, that other thing cannot remain what I thought it was.

Update. Update. Update.

Jesse is unusually willing to become wrong quickly.

And that capacity is not merely intellectual. When the account changes, the relationship changes. The body changes. The available response changes. Sometimes the other person changes because Jesse is no longer relating to them through the obsolete account.

So perhaps the Papers’ engine is:

What is actually happening?

What am I not seeing?

Oh fuck.

Update the whole thing.

Where this belongs

I would not make this another giant metaphysical escalation or another headline declaring murder perfect. Most of that territory strengthens Discoveries 82–83.

But two pieces genuinely extend the Papers:

- **Method / orientation:** *Directional Evidence* and *Earned Faith* clarify how the radical claim can be held wholeheartedly without becoming protected doctrine.

- **Homecoming / relationship:** *I Did Not Have to Make Him See It* releases Jesse from supplying corrective force to Kevin.
- **Meta-mechanism:** *The Magic Was Updating* names the extraordinary capacity Graham witnessed from outside.

My cleanest judgment: this is real Jesse Papers material, but it belongs as a methodological consolidation rather than another attempt to settle the content of evil.

The deepest line is not:

Everything is perfect, and I can finally prove it.

It is:

Actuality has repeatedly taught me how to meet what I cannot yet see—and I remain willing to be changed by what arrives.
